CORE COMPETENCIES IN JAPANESE LANGUAGE & CULTURE CERTIFICATE

**** 15-16 credits ****

WSU's Core Competencies in Japanese Language & Culture certificate program encompasses the study of the Japanese language and culture from novice to low-intermediate levels. It acknowledges that students have mastered the fundamentals of the Japanese language and cultures. It also provides a credential to future employers or academic institutions they have engaged meaningfully in the study of an important global culture.

The certificate program can be a stand alone option or allow students to enter a Japanese minor or major degree program at WSU. It is ideal for individuals who wish to gain insight into the Japanese language and culture or engage in areas related to the Japanese speaking world.

PLEASE NOTE THE FOLLOWING OVERALL CERTIFICATE REQUIREMENTS

1. To fulfill requirements for the certificate, a student must complete a minimum of 15/16 credits of course work in one language area.
2. No more than 4 credits earned at other institutions may apply towards the certificate and no more than 4 hours may be pass/fail. Courses earned at another institution or by AP credit will be determined by the SLCR regarding course equivalencies and allowance in the certificate. All courses must be earned with a grade of C or better or a Satisfactory with 73% or above.
3. If a student transfers 101 and 102 from another institution, only 102 will count toward the certificate in German. The student will be required to take an additional (one) course from Japanese 306, 307 or 308, totaling 15 credits.
4. The University undergraduate certificate fee will apply.
5. 105, 205, 305, 405 Conversation Courses, and Special Topics courses (480) - do not count towards the certificate.
6. For courses taken in Study Abroad Programs or as other transfer credits, please check with the Foreign Languages advisor.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

1. Communicative Proficiency:

Students will communicate in basic foreign language skills. Students will use elementary structures and vocabulary to discuss such things as daily activities, greetings, routines and habits, family, and personal interests. Students will have the skills necessary to carry on very elementary conversations in their language(s) of study.

2. Analytical Ability:

Students will create basic original thoughts in their language(s) of study. Students will gain knowledge of the structure of the language(s) and will therefore be able to use the vocabulary learned to form new thoughts and basic sentences. This ability will grow as students become more and more familiar with the structure of the language(s) of study.

3. Cultural Understanding and Acquisition of Knowledge:

Students will gain a greater understanding of and appreciation for cultures in which the language(s) of study are spoken, particularly in terms of geography, demography, and the vast differences between the target culture(s) and U.S. culture. Students will begin to think critically about the influence of other cultures on North American society as well as the global and personal connections made by learning about other cultures and peoples.
